wooden books series trivium is a compendium of writings on the classical subjects at the heart of a liberal education bringing the wisdom of the past into the twenty first century the trivium refers to the three liberal arts considered in classical greece to be the pillars of critical thought grammar logic and rhetoric following on the success of quadrivium and sciencia trivium gathers six wooden books titles together into a beautiful six color package that presents ancient wisdom in an accessible way trivium will include the books euphonics grammar logic rhetoric poetic meter and form and ethics wooden books was founded in 1999 by designer john martineau near hay on wye the aim was to produce a beautiful series of recycled books based on the classical philosophies arts and sciences using the beatrix potter formula of text facing picture pages and old styles fonts along with hand drawn illustrations and 19th century engravings the books are designed not to date small but stuffed with information eco friendly and educational big ideas in a tiny space there are over 1 000 000 wooden books now in print worldwide and growing

considering that the nature of the human being does not change and that god made the world of created things as a constant means to lead to himself it is no surprise that the liberal arts contain a core unchanging content to understand the principles that direct their own cognitive faculties humans must study the rules of language thought and persuasion trivium to understand the root characteristics of the material world humans must study the principles god uses in ordering creation knowledge about creation that flows from these principles and man s place in creation quadrivium the classical liberal arts are the necessary intellectual prerequisite habits for humanity living in a material world to understand the nature of that world the human soul and god

this is your invitation to an epic educational adventure spanning thousands of years this is your invitation to receive your heritage and join a great conversation carried on through the ages if education has seemed to you to be only a dreary chore or a necessary evil this is your invitation to an education rooted in wonder and in gratitude no matter what you major in and no matter what you plan to do for a living you can dive deeply into an education dedicated to truth goodness and beauty you can be shaped for wisdom and for virtue and learn how to love god with all your mind heart soul and strength as you pursue your calling and prepare for your future open your invitation to the liberal arts

why phonics and grammar are not trivial why have our political discussions in the united states become so ugly and pointless why are we suffering from

such a breakdown in civility is not trivial how studying the traditional liberal arts can set you free laurie endicott thomas explains that the problem boils down to education the word civility originally meant training in the liberal arts the classical liberal arts were a set of seven disciplines that were developed largely in ancient athens to promote productive political discussions within athenian democracy they included three verbal arts the trivium grammar logic and rhetoric they also included four arts of number space and time the quadrivium mathematics geometry music and astronomy these arts helped students learn to think rationally and to express themselves persuasively the ancient romans called these studies the liberal arts because they were considered appropriate for freeborn men as opposed to slaves slaves were taught only the servile and mechanical arts to make them more productive as workers during the renaissance the classical liberal arts curriculum was supplemented by the humanities including history philosophy literature and art like the liberal arts the humanities were intended to promote productive and even pleasant discussions among political decision makers today the sciences would have to be added to that curriculum thomas explains that the problems in our political system start in first grade our teachers are being trained and often forced to use a method of reading instruction that does not work as a result many children suffer from lifelong problems with reading our teachers are also being pressured to neglect the teaching of grammar as a result many children end up with poor reading comprehension and lifelong problems with logical thinking thus they will have difficulty in making or appreciating reasonable arguments thomas argues that we cannot hope to enjoy freedom and equality until all children get the kind of education that is appropriate for free people she concludes with a clear explanation of what that curriculum would be like

the american liberal arts college now appears to be in a crisis that threatens its very existence critics have charged that the college no longer delivers on its promise of a liberal education and is in a state of moral collapse this book analyzes this crisis and offers a radical proposal for its resolution crimmel first explains how a college's infidelity to the ideals of liberal education adversely affects its relationship to society its educational program and its teachers he then provides a definition and a defense of liberal education's ideal finally he demonstrates that the college must not submit to any ideology political agenda or vocational interest and that the college's educational program must be centered around a set of rational theoretical and practical skills and that the college teacher must be autonomous and uncompromised by scholarly or administrative responsibilities
